



The First Lesson Jeremiah 23:23-29

Am I a God near by, says the Lord, and not a God far off? Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the Lord. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the Lord. I have heard what the prophets have said who prophesy lies in my name, saying, "I have dreamed, I have dreamed!" How long? Will the hearts of the prophets ever turn back-- those who prophesy lies, and who prophesy the deceit of their own heart? They plan to make my people forget my name by their dreams that they tell one another, just as their ancestors forgot my name for Baal. Let the prophet who has a dream tell the dream, but let the one who has my word speak my word faithfully. What has straw in common with wheat? says the Lord. Is not my word like fire, says the Lord, and like a hammer that breaks a rock in pieces?

Psalm 82

God arises in the council of heaven; and gives judgment in the midst of the gods:

"How long will you judge unjustly, and show favor to the wicked?

The Second Lesson Hebrews 11:29-12:2

By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned. By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days. By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-- who through faith conquered kingdoms,

administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-- of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.

Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Sermon

The Creed



"Rejoice, Sing Praise"-J. Morgan [Some composer insights]

Intrigued by Tricia's calendar last year—her photos of massive rock formations of SW U.S.—this summer Shirley & I journeyed West by plane, train & auto to see for ourselves God's awesome majestic display of mountainous canyons, valleys, mesas & arroyos. Along a trail toward a granite enclosure, tiniest flashes of color—yellow, orange & crimson—caught my eye: freshly blooming cactus flowers adorning the sharp thorny leaves. Oh my, how convincing then were the psalmist's words juxtaposing—"strength & beauty…are in his (natural) sanctuary!"

The musical setting of this Psalm honoring, praising God features the 'Perfect' interval s-4th ('P4') (e-f-g-a) and its inversion a 5th('P5') a-b-c-d-e, reaching the P8 octave (or P1 unison). Why are these intervals—or distances between notes—called "perfect(P)?" During the Middle Ages they were mandated as the only fitting ending (& beginning) of sacred multi-voiced singing—thus, a kind of alpha & omega, which God is...'Perfect'...but also acoustically they happen to be the root & first partials of the overtone series. Further, as a composer under the tutelage of Neo-Classicism of the 1960's, which hallowed 'the (very) old,' I couldn't resist further weakening allegiance to the tertial (3rd-based chords) of 'common-practice' by combining 4ths ('quartal') and 5ths ('quintal') harmonies to produce further 'austerity'. I added other dashes of 'mystery' by using whole-tone scale (no half-steps) and chromatic scale (all half-steps). Within a throughcomposed form—determined by the psalm text—the initial rising P4th motive recurs throughout as a kind of 'bonding stitch,' climaxing in the grand 'A-men' ("So be it!") P4 + it's inversion P5—all sustained above a grandiose organ cadence deploying a Middle-Age 'no-no' interval of dim5 socalled 'diabolus in musica' ("devil in music") as a kind of 'Satan-chaser'—Bb major→Emajor. Moreover, while this finale chord (Emaj) sounds 'fresh' to us— (i.e, "sing a new song"), yet it (still) is related to the opening: Aha! A P5 above (or P4 below) the original key/chord of A! Soli Deo Gloria! JM
